Compound Verbs

Compound verbs are verbs that are made of one non-verbal part (such as a noun, an adjective, or a preposition) and one simple verb. A compound verb may sometimes give a meaning distant from the original meaning of the two parts. It was mentioned earlier that the number of simple verbs used in today's Persian is something less than 250. All the rest of the verbs are compound verbs made up of these verbs and different nouns and prepositions. Here are some examples of common compound verbs.

The stranger looked at me unhappily.

He/She saw his/her gun and picked it up.

Mina and her sister talk with each other.

I got up from the chair.

They came yesterday and took back all the money.

The emigrants return to the city.

The stranger looked at me unhappily.

Accidental stranger looked at up.

As it can be seen, when the non-verbal part is a preposition, the verb may look very well like a simple verb (As in the second example above). One thing that distinguishes compound verbs is that when being conjugated in the present tense, "مى" comes in between the two parts of the compound verb (Last example).

The biggest group of compound verbs comprises of the ones made using the verb "كردن" (to do, to make).

When there is an object, the object can be attached to the noun part of the compound verb as an enclitic personal pronoun. The first two of the following examples are made using the first two examples from the previous list.

The stranger looked at me unhappily. درد. He/She saw the gun and picked it up. الفنگ را دید و برش داشت. I love you. He/She threw me into the water.
